Re. Robert Tunaley's dancing school:
"Derby April 2, 1777

Mr. Tunaley begs Leave to return his most sincere thanks to his Friends both in Town and Countru, for the Favors already conferred on him, and humbly solicits a Continuance of the same; and informs them that he will open his SCHOOL, at the Old Assembly Room, on Monday the 21st of this instant,Attendance, as usual, 3 days every other Week.
N.B. Those ladies and gentlemen who please to honor Mr. Tunaley with their commands, will oblige him by a speedy Communication of such their Intention."

Notice in Derby Mercury, Thursday 6 October 1785.
"Derby Oct 10th 1785
Mr. Tunaleys' Annual BALL at CHESTERFIELD is fix'd for Friday 21st inst. at the Assembly-Room -Doors to be open'd at Half past Five; -- to begin at Six o'Clock.
N.B. Tickets to be had at the CASTLE INN at 2 s 6 d each"

Notice in Derby Mercury, March 27 ${ }^{\text {th }} 1800$.
Robert Tunaley in partnership with Mr Fritche An advertisement for the dancing school taken from the Derby Mercury March 271800.
"Derby March 24", 1800.

MESSRS. TUNALEY \& FRITCHE respectfully inform their friends and the Public, that their next Quarter will commence at Chesterfield on Thursday the 27th instant , at Duffield, Edge Hill, and Wirksworth, on

Friday the $28^{\text {th }}$, at Burton-Upon-Trent on Thursday the $3^{\text {rd }}$ of April, at Kegworth on Friday the $4^{\text {th }}$, at Longford on Saturday the $5^{\text {th }}$, at Mansfield on Monday the $7^{\text {th }}$, at Sutton on Tuesday the $8^{\text {th }}$, at Heath, and at Derby, on Wednesday the 9th."

Nottingham Journal
Mar 2, 1805
"The partnership of Tunaley \& Fritche, dancing teachers, is to cease from Mar 25, and the business will be continued by Tunaley with Mr Keys, their former assistant. Reopens at Mansfield, Apr 1 (also at Sutton in Ashfield, Nottingham \& Kegworth)."
N.B. 1805 was the year Robert's daughter Mary married Francis Boott Jnr. and the year Robert made out his will.

27 January 1813
"DANCING.
MESSRS. TUNALEY and KEYS respectfully inform their Friends and the Public, they propose OPENING their SCHOOL at the usual place, Nottingham, on Wednesday next the 1st of February."

29 July 1814
"DANCING.
MESSRS. TUNALEY and KEYS respectfully inform their Friends and the Public they propose opening their School at MANSFIELD, Monday the 1st of August next and at the usual place NOTTINGHAM, on Wednesday the 3rd."

Notice in Derby Mercury Wednesday 16 August 1820
Re: death of Robert Tunaley d. 11 August 1820 (incomplete):
"On Friday last, in the 76th year of his age, Mr. Tunaley. . . (of this place?)"

Notice in Derby Mercury, dated August $15^{\text {th }} 1820$.
From widow Constantia to announce that Thomas Snape Tunaley is continuing the dancing school with his late father's partner Mr Keys.

CONSTANTIA TUNALEY, (widow of the late Robert Tunaley) returns her most grateful acknowledgements to the friends of her late Husband for the many favors conferred upon him, and respectfully informs them that her son THOMAS TUNALEY, who has been under the tuition of the first masters in London, will, jointly with her late husband's partner MR. KEYS, continue the business as usual, in whose behalf she solicits a continuance of their kind patronage.

Derby, Full Street, August 15, 1820".
Footnote: In $18^{\text {th }}$ century England, the spelling of words "honor" and "honour" were both acceptable as were "favor" and "favour". Subsequently, "honor" and "favor" became the accepted spelling in America and "honour" and "favour" the accepted spelling in England.
